Graduates who complete the major will be prepared for transfer opportunities and careers in fields that require critical thinking and clear written communications, as well as a deeper understanding of the importance of being an active and engaged citizen. When transferring to a four-year college or university, graduates will have the equivalent skills and knowledge of a junior.

Electives should be chosen with the advice of an academic advisor to meet the requirements of the intended transfer institution.

- Based on transfer pathways, students may choose to complete four semesters of a World Language or pursue a History Concentration (U.S. History, European/World History, or Public History). Refer to the Transfer Elective list below for course options.
- Students must take HIS 101 Western Civilizations Pre-1600 CE and HIS 102 Western Civilizations Post-1600 CE or HIS 111 World Civilizations Pre-1500 CE and HIS 112 World Civilizations Post-1500 CE as a sequence, based on transfer partner preference.
- Students who plan to take MTH 245 Statistics I should take MTH 154 Quantitative Reasoning or MTH 161 PreCalculus I first. Credit will not be awarded for both MTH 155 Statistical Reasoning and MTH 245 Statistics I, or for both MTH 261 Applied Calculus I and MTH 263 Calculus I, or for both MTH 262 Applied Calculus II and MTH 264 Calculus II. Students should consult with an advisor to ensure mathematics courses meet their intended transfer institution requirement.
- This elective is not needed if selections for all other requirements total 60 credits or more.
- Students must choose courses from two of the following three areas: Fine Arts, Humanities, and Literature. Credit will not be awarded for taking two courses from the same area.
